<b>Community Characteristics</b>	<p>Plumas County has a population of 20,824 people (2000 Census). Located in the North Eastern Sierra Nevada mountains, the 2,600 square mile county has elevations ranging from 1,800 to 8,372 feet. It is one of the 15 California “frontier counties” due to its’ small population, self-sufficient pioneer attitudes and geographical isolation. Five communities comprise the key population centers, each within a valley or lake basin. Quincy (American Valley), the county seat has 5,500 people, Graeagle (Mohawk Valley), Greenville (Indian Valley), Portola, and Chester (Almanor Basin), have 2-4,000 people each. The county is the homeland to the Maidu California Indians and has an emerging Hispanic population, especially in the eastern portion of the county.</p>
<b>Services</b>	<p><b>Early Care and Education:</b> Culturally appropriate early childhood care and education for American Indian and Hispanic children ages 0-5 utilizing Parents as Teachers and Raising a Reader programs.</p> <p><b>Parenting and Family support:</b> Home visitation and early intervention services for children ages 0-5 and their parents, guardians, or caregivers by community health outreach workers (including bilingual), public health nurse, community outreach worker, infant stimulation specialist, infant massage therapist and lactation educator.</p> <p><b>Health and Social Services:</b> Child screenings and assessments, and health/immunization information provided through home visitation, collaborations, and Kindergarten Round-up.</p> <p><b><u>New Service FY 2005-06:</u></b> Newborn hearing testing conducted by Public Health Nurse during new parent home visit.</p> <p><b>School Capacity:</b> Kindergarten Entry Profile FY 2006-07, School District wide/outcomes based Kindergarten Transition, system to share confidential information, and joint ECE and teacher trainings</p> <p><b>Infrastructure/Administration/Evaluation:</b> School Readiness Consortium, Early Childhood Education/Kindergarten Teacher Workgroup, Parent Advisory Councils, Home Visitors Coalition.</p>
